FROM THE BENEFICE January 2024

Dear Friends,

As we move into 2024, the news bulletins remind us that Peace on Earth is not a reality for everyone, and that for millions of people the greeting 'Happy New Year' would be an empty concept. At the feast of Epiphany on 6<sup>th</sup> January, we remember the visit of the Wise Men to the infant Jesus with their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Distrustful of Herod, they went home by a different route, and soon afterwards Jesus became a refugee as the family fled to Egypt to escape Herod's envy and anger. Many innocent children would die as Herod sought to eliminate this threat to his position and power.

How similar to events in our own time. Tyrants still cause immense suffering, and children are killed in appalling numbers in war-torn countries. The problems are dire, and global political leaders are unable to find solutions and powerless to help. And yet good things are happening, often unreported. The humanitarian and medical charities say little, but they do act, often at great risk to their own lives. We can help them with money ('Give until it hurts' is a good rule), by showing them that we care, and most importantly, with our prayers. It may seem that we can do little to make a difference in such great matters. But as Christians we believe that God has a plan for this world, and that he is in charge. Jesus came to us at that first Christmas to show us how much we are loved. He wants us to find our place, small or great, in that plan and to try our best to love others as much as we love ourselves.

This is not the easiest of tasks! But our benefice provides some wonderful role models – great Christians who care for others across the churches and communities. My 2024 resolution is to try harder to be like them; to be a better neighbour, and to remember especially those neighbours far away, who are suffering so much.

RE-CYCLING IS NOW EVERY TUESDAY in Marston Magna from 6 a.m. on Tuesdays 5<sup>th</sup>, 12<sup>th</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup> and Thursday 28<sup>th</sup> December. Garden Wheelie Bin Collections are collected from 6 a.m., 7<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> December. Refuse bins will be collected once every three weeks and the next ones are Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> December and 3<sup>rd</sup> January.

RE-CYCLING IS NOW EVERY FRIDAY in Rimpton from 6 a.m. on Fridays 1<sup>st</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>, 15<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> December and Sunday 31<sup>st</sup> December. Garden Wheelie Bin Collections are being collected from 6 a.m., on Thursdays 7<sup>th</sup> and 21<sup>st</sup> December. Refuse bins will be collected once every three weeks and will be on Fridays 8<sup>th</sup> and 31<sup>st</sup> December.

This all does depend upon available staff and there are delays at present, caused by staff shortages. Recycling Centres are open for winter times.

#### Letter from Bishop Michael, Bishop of Bath & Wells Hope in deed

I'd love to be writing a sunny New Year's article reflecting a boundless global optimism about the future. Yet the reality is very different. War in Ukraine drags on and tensions in the Middle East remain dangerous. The cost-of-living crisis continues, and many are finding things tough. Pessimism rather than optimism is the order of our day.

In such circumstances, where can hope be found? For Christians, confidence, and assurance rest in the promise of the future that God has in store for us. In the Bible God says: 'See, I am making all things new. I am the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning, and the end' (Revelation 21: 5-6). Christian hope is that whatever may be happening to us now, God has a very different and favorable future in store for us.

Critically, the point of such hope is not just to enable us to say 'Well don't worry about present circumstances. It's all going to be all right eventually.' Hope's purpose is to shape how we live and what we do now. It's to enable us to live out the words of the old Christian Aid poster that said, 'We believe in life before death'.

Towards the end of last year, I had the privilege of visiting several of the deaneries of our diocese. On those visits I heard at first-hand how through the work of our parishes, schools and chaplaincies, Christian hope translates into practical action for good amongst the everyday lives of local communities. We offer debt counselling and food banks, support for families and care of the lonely and isolated. All these and many more were amazing examples of how we can join with God to 'make all things new' right here, right now.

So, as we start a new year, please can I encourage us all not to stare into our glasses, lamenting their being half full? Rather, through how we live and what we do, let us fill them with the new wine of God's kingdom – overflowing to the brim. For that is hope in deed.

#### **THE RAIN REPORT (November)**

November was another wet month with rainfall totalling 120 mms (4 ¾ inches), well above the November average of 97 mms (3 ¾ inches). There was some rain on each of the first 10 days of the month totalling 69.5 mms (2 ¾ inches). The next 10 days saw 8 wet days and 43 mms (1 ¾ inches) of rainfall. The final 11 days were relatively dry with just 2 wet days and 7.5 mms (¼ inch) of rainfall.

In the last 32 years, there have been 9 wetter Novembers, with November 2002 the wettest with 189.5 mms (7 ½ inches), which is the wettest month I have ever recorded. There have been a few relatively dry Novembers with 2021 easily the driest with just 10.5 mms (½ inch).

Happy Christmas to all my readers. I understand there are still a few of you out there.

#### **MARSTON MARBLE**

There was a reference in the October 2023 Magazine to Marston Marble. As stated there, it was discovered in Marston in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century in a comparatively small quantity, apparently in or near the stream. I can confirm that it has aroused the interests of geologists.

Purbeck Marble is in fact a stone, but Marston Marble looks like standard marble and can be polished. Like other marbles it is dark grey but flecked throughout with tiny specks of white which I understand are tiny fossils.

I believe there was a piece used for a fireplace in a house near the Church in Aller in Somerset. There is also a large example in Rimpton, but its locality is not publicised because of the rarity of the substance. Sherborne Museum also has a sample.

If anyone knows of the existence of any other examples, it would no doubt be of interest.

#### **Diocese News in brief**

#### The Souls of our Shoes

An exhibition by the Mothers' Union has been on display in Wells Cathedral, and at November's Diocesan Synod, to draw attention to the issue of domestic violence. It features shoes of all different styles, sizes, and colours along with comments from those who have walked away from abuse and those who have journeyed with them.

Created by the Mothers' Union in Scotland, it is an extension of the Union's initiatives to highlight abuse, and the practical and prayerful support that is offered to families. It is hoped it can "provide a reminder that with timely help, many can escape from their abusive situations, rebuild their confidence and live in safety."

#### Good global neighbours

Pupils at St Bartholomew's CE Primary School have been presented with a Bronze Award from Christian Aid's Global Neighbours Scheme for their global citizenship work. From creating bee gardens, sending water purifying materials to Morocco to toilet twinning, pupils, and staff at this wonderful Crewkerne primary school have been working hard to take their place as compassionate global citizens.

#### Sustainable flowers

More than 40 church flower arrangers from 15 churches attended St James' in Taunton to learn how to arrange flowers in a more environmentally friendly way. Research suggests that traditional floral foam, also known as oasis, is non-recyclable and contains the same amount of plastic as 10 plastic shopping bags.

Angie Blackwell of Cottage Flowers, Ilminster shared her alternatives and Lyn from St James' said, "Angie shared lots of hints and tips... I for one certainly came away more confident in moving away from using floral foam and have taken another step toward an eco-friendlier ministry in flowers."

### Women's Health Survey – NHS Cancer Screening Programmes

I hope you are well and keeping safe in this cold and wet weather.

Nationally and across Somerset, particularly in women, participation in the NHS cancer screening programmes (breast, cervical and bowel) is declining. Yet, we know that cancer screening saves lives as it helps to detect cancer or the risk of cancer earlier and improve the likelihood of successful treatment.

As Commissioning Manager for Planned Care and Care, I am, in collaboration with NHS England, doing a piece of work to understand why women in Somerset do or don't take part in the NHS cancer screening programmes. The first stage is an online survey which will help to inform more targeted engagement activities.

We would like to hear from as many women as possible, so that your views and experiences can help to identify action that can be taken to improve participation in the NHS cancer screening programmes and any changes that may be required to ensure that these services are accessible to all.
