Dear All,

A grand total of NINE people correctly recited last month's Memory Verse to me and were rewarded with a sweetie from my perpetual pocket packet. Now, that's not bad for a first time but I'm sure we can do better with this month's - here it is:

"Seek first the Kingdom of God, and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." (Matthew 6:33)

Those words come from a famous speech that Jesus made called the Sermon on the Mount. (In this case "mount" means he was on a mountain, not on horseback.) When he says "all these things" he's referring to some of the things he's just been talking about - things that affect us all. Daily essentials like food and clothes; natural concerns like our health; common anxieties like our appearance and our reputation. It's normal and right that we should be concerned about such things, but concern can easily become distorted into over-anxiety and even obsession. In the Christian faith this time of the year is called "Lent" and it's a good time to take an honest look at ourselves and ask ourselves if we've got our priorities right. Are we applying the right amount of practical and emotional effort in the right places? Those of us who are Christians should remember the promise that Jesus made - that if we keep the Kingdom of God as our primary goal, we'll get on better in the other parts of our lives as well.

"That's all very well, Vicar," I hear you say (because I can read your minds, you know), "But what does 'the Kingdom of God' actually mean?" Well, you'll have to come to church to find out. In the meantime, I've refilled my pocket with sweets - memorise the verse and claim yours.

RE-CYCLING IS NOW EVERY FRIDAY in both Marston Magna and Rimpton from 6 a.m. on 4th, 11th, 18th and 25th April. Garden Wheelie Bin Collections are collected from 6 a.m., on Thursdays the 10th and 24th April. Refuse bins will be collected once every three weeks and the next one is on 11th April, then 2nd May.

This all does depend upon available staff. Recycling Sites will move to their summer opening hours from Tuesday 1 April. All sites will remain open from 9am to 4pm on weekends. Midweek, sites will be open from 9am to 6pm. Opening days vary from site to site, check online before you visit

Letter from Ruth Worsley Bishop of Taunton 'God is good... all the time!'

When I was a priest in Nottingham, I remember thinking that as a parish we seemed to reflect more of the story of the crucifixion of Christ rather than His resurrection. Ours was a parish which had many personal stories of loss and suffering, of challenge and trial, and sometimes this made it difficult to lift our faces to the horizon to see the triumph and glory beyond the grave.

As we approach Easter, I want to encourage us to take time to 'walk the way of the cross', to notice God's grace as we do so, even in the painful moments as well as keeping our eyes fixed on the coming glory.

As I write this, I am catching glimpses of the kingfisher on its perch outside my study window. Always a delight! It sits on the branch across the moat in stillness, watching for the sign of a fish before it suddenly dives and then crests the water with its prize. A splash of colour rarely seen by many. It fills me with hope and joy, two gifts which I think Easter inspires.

Walking through Lent we are continually called to become conscious of our mortality and are reminded of the price Jesus paid on our behalf. Giving himself in death that we might have life. And we have that life because his death was not the end but the beginning of a new chapter, of life in all its fulness.

So, whatever the circumstances of your life this Easter, allow yourself to fully recognise and experience the challenges but never lose the prospect of the glory to come! 'God is good... all the time!'

THE RAIN REPORT (February 2025)

February rainfall totalled 70.5 mms (2¾ inches) with 13 wet days, just above the February average of 61 mms (2½ inches). There was no particularly heavy rainfall during February. The last 9 days of the month saw the majority of this total with 48 mms (2 inches) spread evenly over the last 9 days of the month.

There have been some very wet Februarys since 1991 with 148 mms (5¾ inches) in 2014 and 141mms (5½ inches) in 2020, and last year with 119 mms (4¾ inches). The dryest I have recorded was 1993 with just 5.5 mms (¼ inch) and 1998 and 2023 having 7mms each.

Candles for Ukraine

It is over three years ago that Russia invaded Ukraine and despite the recent attempts to initiate a cease-fire, the war continues. The infrastructure in Ukraine is still under immense pressure; huge areas of the country are regularly without electricity – families with young children and/or elderly family members, hearing missiles and drones obliterating nearby houses.

With contributions from parishes in the Yeovil Deanery, Lufton Church has managed to deliver six carloads of used and unwanted candles to the Swindon Humanitarian Aid Programme who make trench candles and large blocks of wax from odd ends that are then sent to volunteers in Ukraine who make huge numbers of candles for heat and light for those in need.

Our Benefice has been collecting all we can over the past year – but the need is just as great now as when I first asked for your help.

If you have any new or partly used candles – any colour, size and scent - that you could donate to this very worthy cause, please contact me and I will arrange collection. Alternatively, you can leave them in Rimpton church.

OUR HENRY'S COLUMN (from April 1998)

Most residents must now be aware of the Marston Magna Church Restoration project with details of the work to be done, and what has been completed so far and the financial position to date which has been comprehensively covered in this Magazine and received publicity in the local press and The Grapevine (official newspaper of the Bath & Wells Diocese).

In 1924, the Vicar at that time, the Rev. G F C Peppin, published a most interesting booklet - 'Marston Magna and its Church' - and I am sure he would have had no objections to the following extracts being used for the benefit of present-day residents.

"The Church is dedicated to St Mary the Virgin and consists of a nave, chancel, a lady chapel on the north side of the nave, and a western tower. It possesses features of unusual interest; the four main great periods of English ecclesiastical architecture being represented.

That a Saxon church existed on the site prior to the Norman Conquest is proved by the existence of two small pre-Norman stone window-heads built in on each side of the central arch. The remains of the Norman church are very distinct, the whole of the north wall of the chancel belonging to this period. A part of this wall has herring-bone masonry, an isolated patch with ordinary random work below and around it. The lower part of the eastern wall below the east window also belong to this period, as well as a small piece of work under the south window of the chancel where the sill of an earlier window still remains.

In the north wall of the chancel there is a small Norman window, square outside, rounded, and with a deep splay inside. Originally there were two Norman windows in this wall, the one farther west having been blocked up for the insertion of a later (15th century) window to give more light to the chancel.

Another complete feature of this period is the fine Norman font with scallop moulding round its sides. Standing on its original stem and base it is lined inside with the original lead. The remains of a sundial can be found on the 14th century buttress of the south wall, commonly known as a "scratch dial".

The present church clock was erected to celebrate the conclusion of the Great War - (World War I) - and was dedicated by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese on November 11th, 1919, the first anniversary of Armistice Day. It was by the

unanimous vote of the whole parish that this was made the public memorial of so great an event, and all the parishioners had entered heart and souls into the scheme. At the same time there was dedicated a brass tablet in memory of the nine men of the village who had lost their lives during that war. In recent years the clock was modernised, and the working and winding is controlled by electricity instead of by hand.

Having finished the history lesson I can now re-tell the corniest tale of the month which would come under the heading of a "shaggy dog" story if it wasn't about a herd of cows. It was the time of year when the cattle stayed in the field all night but there occurred a very sharp and unforecasted frost and in the morning when the farmer went out to round up the dairy cows for milking, he found them all frozen to the ground and unable to move. He could think of nothing but pouring some hot water around their feet, but this did not release them. Suddenly a little old lady approached him from across the field and noting his predicament asked if she could help.

The farmer explained the problem to her and said that although he would welcome any assistance, he did not see what she could possibly do. However, not to be deterred, the old lady walked round the herd placing a hand on the forehead of each cow in turn, and lo and behold, the animals were freed. The farmer was profuse in his thanks and then mentioned that her face seemed very familiar to him. "Perhaps so", answered the old lady, "my name is Thaw a Herd". (Thora Hird for anyone needing help!)

A neighbour of mine recently had a very narrow escape when attempting to start a new sport which would have been called Open Cast Potholing. And it came to pass that the ground opened, and she was swallowed up, and disappeared from the sight of men. Providence was with her however, and she eventually re-surfaced with feathers ruffled but luckily no serious injury. Happily, all is Al at Lloyds and she has no need to Sue.
