Dear all,

A new Archbishop of Canterbury has been named. When she takes up her post, she will find herself pulled in four ways: Up and down, left and right.

First, up and down. The Church of England has an "Upstairs Church" and a "Downstairs Church". The Upstairs Church is a complex structure of institutions and titles, synods and councils. There's a central hub in London; 42 "Dioceses" (regional groupings of churches), each with its Cathedral, Bishops and Diocesan Office, home to a well-intentioned army of administrators, managers, "facilitators", and "enablers".

The Downstairs Church is made up of faithful Christian pilgrims at prayer and worship. They serve their communities in the name of Christ, running playgroups and cake sales; visiting their neighbours in hospital; arranging flowers, making coffee, filling rotas, cleaning the church, cutting the grass – and in many cases maintaining the crumbling fabric of beautiful medieval buildings.

The upstairs and downstairs churches misunderstand each other - upstairs genuinely believe that they are there to support downstairs; downstairs sees only increasing requests for money and decreasing deployment of clergy. The new Archbishop will be under great pressure to spend most of her time upstairs (where she has spent most of her professional life). The more time she can spend downstairs, the better the leader she will be.

Meanwhile, she will also be pulled from left and right. Worldwide, the Anglican Church has millions of members with widely differing views. One of the most significant fault lines lies between:

- Conservatives who hold that the Christian message is timeless and therefore should challenge changes in society's attitude and behaviour which depart from it; and
- Liberals who think that the Christian message should be reinterpreted as society changes, in order better to engage with modern people.

Since WW2, and especially since the 1960s, this conflict has become ever more pronounced. It is a "forever war" with no sign of resolution. The war is internecine, but its battles become visible to non-combatants when they are fought in the theatre of sex and sexuality. This happened in 1992 over the ordination of women as Priests; in 2002 over the remarriage of divorcees in church; and in 2015 over the consecration of women as Bishops. The current battle is over the marriage of same-sex couples. Each time, liberals push for change; conservatives express opposition.

Up and down, left and right. These vertical and horizontal lines are a cross on which every Archbishop of Canterbury has to suffer. I therefore cannot bring myself to "congratulate" the new holder of that ancient and impossible role, but I wish her well and we must all pray for her and for her family. May she, and we, in the words of this month's Memory Verse . .

"Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfil the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2)

### <u>Bishop of Bath & Wells</u> Let's walk into the light

A story that's often told in our churches comes from the fourth chapter of John's Gospel. It tells of Jesus, in the blinding heat of midday meeting a Samaritan woman at the well in a town called Sychar. The woman is hoisting up heavy buckets of water in the hot sun. She's there because she's a woman with 'a reputation' and it's the only time of day she can avoid the muttering of her neighbours who meet at the well at cooler hours.

In an extraordinary encounter, Jesus sees deep into the woman's heart. Through their conversation Jesus brings about her healing and restoration into the community from which she is estranged. It's a story of life, possibility, new beginnings and forgiveness.

The woman at the well is not the only Biblical story set in Sychar. There's another, contained in the 34<sup>th</sup> chapter of the Book of Genesis. This is a tale of terror that's never heard in our churches; the rape of a girl called Dinah. It's a dark, nasty tale of violence that wrecks the life of individuals, families and the entire community. So, we don't speak about it. We keep it hidden.

Sometimes people say to me of safeguarding 'It's just a tick box exercise', an onerous compliance requirement. Rather I would say that our work in safeguarding asks fundamental questions about the kind of places we want our churches to be. Just like the Bible passages I've mentioned, we can be places of hiddenness, silence, and hurt. Or places of life, new beginnings and restoration.

Accounts like the Makin review have shone light on our story. We've also been working hard to bring about change. While we cannot be complacent, I am intensely proud of all that was revealed about safeguarding in Bath and Wells by our independent audit that happened earlier this year. This told us that we are moving towards a much better story. So let's build on the momentum we have created. Let's walk into the light.

### THE RAIN REPORT (September 2025)

September rainfall totalled 92 mms (3½ inches) with 15 wet days, well above the September average of 64 mms (2½ inches), but only half of last year's September total of 187 mms (7 inches). The majority,84 mms (3¼ inches) of this rain fell in the first half of the month with 44 mms (1¾ inches) falling in the first 4 days. The second half saw just 8 mms (¼ inch) with 4 wet days.

Last year's 187mms (7½ inches) was by a long way the wettest September I have recorded. 1999 is second with 134mms (5½ inches). There have been several relatively dry Septembers. 2003 the dryest with just 9.5 mms (3/8th inch) with 1997 just behind on 12 mms (½ inch).

The total rainfall this year to date (Sept  $30^{th}$ ) is 492 mms (19 ½ inches). It would take another 373 mms (14 ½ inches) in the final 3 months to reach the annual average of 865mms (34 inches). You never know, we shall see.

### Capturing creation

This autumn's Chew Valley Nature Photography Festival at St Andrew's church, Chew Magna brought people together to give thanks for God's creation and renew their commitment to care for it. Stunning photography, conservation displays and children's activities helped visitors reflect on the beauty and fragility of God's world.

A new film honouring local naturalists Richard Brock opened the weekend. Bishop Michael led the closing service in which he spoke about trusting in God and working together to protect His world. Despite the showery weather, the festival drew steady crowds who engaged in conversations about faith, the environment, and

how the Church can help nurture and care for creation.

### Coming together in worship

More than 2,500 pupils and staff came together to worship online recently. Led by Bishop Michael who opened the service by lighting a candle. The event brought Church of England schools together from Bath to Exmoor in song, prayer and reflection. Speaking with those gathered Bishop Michael spoke of Zacchaeus. He said, "It's a story that tells us that God never gives up on us, whoever we are and whatever we've done. All of us are always welcomed into God's family."

Director of Education Ed Gregory said, "The online gatherings will now be a regular opportunity for schools to worship together, celebrate faith and grow in community."

### 82 years of service to the church

When 94-year-old Roy Jukes first began playing the organ in church, the Second World War was still underway. Roy was just 12 years old. Little did he know then that he would still be playing in his nineties. "By the time I was 10 or 11, I was playing short voluntaries before the morning service. Occasionally the organist failed to turn up, and I would play the hymns. Eventually my father came back from a trustees' meeting to tell me that I was appointed organist, that was on my 12th birthday!" Roy has no plans to draw the final stop, he says, "It's a way of life."

### 100 years of the WI in Marston Magna

The Women's' Institute in Marston Magna and Rimpton is our oldest village organisation. From November we'll be starting to celebrate and mark our Centenary!

Back in 1925, (10 years after the Institute started in the UK) a group of village ladies met to discuss whether a WI could be established (to include Rimpton). The idea of this club for the village came from a man! The Reverend Alfred Bartlett, who is buried in Marston Magna churchyard - his grave is just opposite the door.

Having decided that the club should go ahead, the inaugural meeting was held on the 8th of December in the Schoolroom (on the bend on Camel Street diagonally across from the church). A Mr Irish was paid 1 shilling to provide 16 cakes which were then sold for 1 penny, with a cup of tea for a second penny. As today, funding the club was a necessity

so on that evening a 'white elephant' stall was setup which, after a few years, reverted to an annual fee for members.

The club was popular, and in 1927 moved to the new Foresters Hall, on the site of our current hall. That hall opened in 1926 and was bought by the Village Hall Committee in 1948.

The intention back at the start was - and remains - to provide a women's social club that would also offer opportunities for learning (don't forget that 100 years ago, formal education for women was limited and rural life could be quite isolating). In the early years, topics such as dressmaking, food growing and cooking, were important. There were also outings in Messrs Birds charabancs which must have been popular. These went as far as Southampton, Cheddar and Torquay!

Sport also played a part with a cricket team being formed which regularly played Montacute and, occasionally the village team! I wonder where the cricket pitch was? There was also a Ladies skittle team which apparently was very successful.

Competitions were popular and in the early years included best peeled apple, the most wildflowers in a jam jar, best darned sock and, of course, jams and jellies. Since 'Jerusalem' was sung at every meeting (a tradition that has largely stopped in UK WI's) it's presumably where the term 'jam and Jerusalem' came from - often viewed unfavourably.

But what about today? The late Queen Elizabeth was an active member of the Sandringham WI. Her words are very apt:

"Women have been granted the vote, British women have climbed Everest and the country has elected its first female prime minister. The Women's Institute has been a constant throughout, gathering women together, encouraging them to acquire new skills and nurturing unique talents."

Of course, many women take part in education without the WI but thinking back to those early years, these were significant and accessible opportunities that wouldn't have otherwise existed.

Our meetings now are very informal. Like all organisations, the WI has had to evolve to stay relevant and interesting to women of all ages. We're a group of village women who enjoy each other's company and enjoy listening to interesting speakers. In the coming year, we will be hearing about creating natural flood defences, the Dorset coast, Yeovil 100 years ago, as well as visits to The Smokery and Lyme Regis (not in a charabanc!). We'll also be hosting an Anniversary Tea in the village hall for villagers in July. Some of the meetings are open to all villagers (even men!) and we're always happy to see visitors. There are over

100 WIs in Somerset and we regularly get to together with some of the more local ones for quizzes, meals etc.

WI facts:

- In the 1890's a Canadian woman started a movement aimed at educating women in household science and child-rearing. She had lost a child through contaminated milk and did not want others to suffer that fate. This was the start of the WI.
- During WWII, our WI had 67 members, the most ever for probably obvious reasons. Members donated biscuits and cigarettes which were sent to the troops. The first and only meeting cancellation (aside from COVID restrictions) was in September 1939, as war was declared.
- In the 1940's, a competition was held to peel a potato blindfold. There's no record of any injuries!
- In 1955 Rimpton formed their own WI
- In the swinging 60's, our WI shrunk in size. I wonder if this is perhaps because it had become more common for women to work and drive
- Today the WI is the largest women's voluntary organisation in the UK.

My mother was a WI member and President of Steeple Morden WI in Hertfordshire, for many years. I know it helped her integrate into the village when we moved there in 1970. It inspired her and I recall the strong bonds that she felt with other members in the village, that led to lifelong friendships.
